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TREE STORIES - PART 1

THE BO TREE (Ficus religiosa) is by far the most significant tree of Honolulu Botanical Gardens large inventory. Some 500 years ago Prince Gautama of India is said to have meditated under this tree, achieving enlightenment and becoming the Buddha, the 'enlightened one'. In 288 B.C. a plant propagated from that tree was planted in the temple grounds of Anuradhapura, Sri Lanka. It still grows there. I have seen it. In response to Mary Foster's large donations to various Buddhist programs in Sri Lanka she was sent a plant propagated from that venerable tree. It was planted in her garden and is now 100 years old and may be seen at the 'ewa end of the second terrace at Foster Garden near the visitor entry. Note the unusual shape of the foliage. It is an important Buddhist art motif.

This is the first in a series of tree stories about those magnificent trees in the Honolulu Botanical Gardens. Each of these stories is written by someone with first-hand knowledge of how that tree came to be planted in our gardens and what makes it special. The ONGA nursery growers will be there selling plants and offering their practical expertise on how best to grow them. Guided tours of Foster Garden will again be conducted by HBG-trained docents. And, the Oahu Invasive Species Committee will be there to help you with information on the early detection of insect pests.

What is new at this plant sale is: classes. We will be offering three 45-minute classes in the HBG class-room located right next to the glass house in the middle of the plant sale. You can sign up for the classes at the Friends Information booth. We only have room for 25 "students" for each class, so sign up early. We know you can't get smart by taking just one class, but each class will make you a little smarter and it will introduce you to one of the many resources available on Oahu that can help you continue your plant education. Class Descriptions

General Orchid Culture: This class will cover all aspects of growing orchids successfully and will address various challenges and give simple solutions.

More good news! The staff at the Honolulu Botanical Gardens (HBG) now numbers a full 40 (32 full-time and 8 part-time employees) with the addition of three more professionals.
